**TEXT 2:**

Graphology is the study of a person's handwriting to obtain information about his/her personality. Because most scientists classify graphology as a pseudo science, its practice is limited in the United States. However many American business firms consult graphologists about which people to hire. At least one American university-the new school for Research in New York City- teaches graphology as a serious diagnostic aid.

Some principles of graphology have been found to be true by legitimate scientific researchers. For examples, handwriting is affected by illness, old age, and tension. But most of the broader claim of graphology lack scientific proof. For example, graphologists claim that lines slanting upward indicate enthusiasm, and that lines slanting downwards indicate discouragement. A few scientific researchers have studied the relationship between handwriting and personality. It is important to distinguish their work from that of most graphologists with whom the public comes into contact.

Despite the lack of evidence for the claims of graphology, some psychologists consider the study of handwriting a useful diagnostic tool. Several psychology textbooks on projective techniques include discussions of graphology. Such techniques are testing methods that obtain information about a patient's personality without asking direct questions about it.

Many psychologists have called for thorough scientific studies of graphology. However, scientific research indicates that graphology has limited value for the study of character, health, and personality.

**TEXT 3:**

The American game of football traces its inception to a game that resembled soccer and was played in the eastern US around 1850. Instead of kicking around ball into a net as it is done in today's soccer games, players kicked the ball across the opposing team's goal line. Those soccer teams of the mid 1800s had 30 or more players on the field at one time; nowadays both soccer and football teams complete with only 11 players. As this soccer like game more popular, stricter rules were instituted, and colleges established teams. The first college game was played on November 6, 1869, in New Jersey. Rutgers beat the college of New Jersey, now Princeton University. The first game most closely resembling modern football took place in 1874 in Cambridge, Massachusetts between Harvard and McGill (Canada) universities. The Canadians preferred to play rugby, an English game that allows running while holding the ball and trickling opposite players. The Harvard team wanted to play its game of soccer advancing the ball by kicking. The teams reached a compromise; they would play two games, the first using Harvard rules, and the next following McGill's rules. Harvard enjoyed McGill's game so much that it presented it to other Eastern schools. The new game, with rugby-like modifications, gained acceptance. The eastern colleges soon began to alter and improve the modified soccer game which by then had been renamed football. One of the first football players, Walter Camp became a pivotal force in updating the game. Under his tutelage in 1880s, official rules were established. He was the primary architect of the four down system, the yardage needed, and the centre snap to the quarterback. He and C. Witney initiated the tradition of selecting an all American team.

More and more colleges began playing football, and it spread beyond the East Coast. Rivalries between teams from different colleges, high schools, and towns continue to this day.
